## The Homeless Outreach Support Services Initiative in Lethbridge



- Some chronically homeless patients were not getting connected to the supports and services they required.
- The pilot focused on improving access to appropriate programs and services for these clients with complex needs.



## **Project Findings**

#### Researcher Role

 Locate and re-use existing assessment/medical information.

#### **Common Application Form**

 Collect information once and share it with Human Services programs.

### **Weekly Case Conferencing**

 To enable a shared understanding of client issues and concerns. In some cases, a neuropsychological assessment was used to understand the support requirements of complex clients.



## Alberta Hospital Edmonton Coordinated Discharge Planning



Identified barriers preventing patients from being connected with appropriate housing, supports and services prior to their discharge.

Document and test a discharge process for patients prior to their discharge with the goal to help patients maintain access to relevant GoA programs and housing services prior to leaving the institution.



## **Project Findings**

## Discharge Service Prioritization Decision Assistance Tool (D-SPDAT)

 Assisted in the housing referral process by prioritizing patients based on need, as well as highlighting the areas that likely required intensive support by a case manager.

### Housing

 Coordinated Intake expanded their referral criteria for the test to include 'at risk of homelessness'.



## **Project Findings**

#### **Awareness and Training**

 Hospital Social Workers, government staff, and Coordinated Intake all took part in training on the new processes.

#### **Information Sharing**

 The creation and distribution of the Collection and Disclosure of Patient Information document successfully allowed information sharing between AHE, GoA and community agency staff.

Provincial Transition Planning Committee is currently reviewing results and framing recommendations.



## Alternative to Warrant Apprehension Project

- Crown can recommend warrants be vacated, charges withdrawn, etc...
- Uses a progressive plea bargaining process.
- Beneficial to help clients access the justice system and resolve outstanding legal issues.





### **Identification for the Homeless**

- Strategy 15 calls to Simplify personal identification requirements for accessing programs and services.
- Identification (ID) for the Homeless Program created in 2010
  - Address Authorization
  - Identity Verification & Certification
- Expanding to
  - Alberta HealthServices
  - Prisons
  - Youth

#### Strategy 2:


Establish a provincial electronic information management system and provide funding for its deployment.







Individuals from the Housing First Program have achieved housing stability. 73% housing first clients have remained housed.




# Housing First Clients Ethnicity, Gender, and Age Distribution









Return On Investment – Health System Encounters April 1, 2009 – March 31, 2014 Housing First Participants


